Things are coming together for what we believe will be one of the best Prime Timers Worldwide conventions for a long time. The primary

convention committee has been supplemented with hospitality and registration committees. They have met to define responsibilities for food, alcohol and the registration process. Our fellow Texas chapters will host a Texas Hospitality Night along with San Antonio on Wednesday the 30th.

The spacious lobby of the hotel with its dramatic staircase will be the location for our Halloween costume party. The hospitality suite will dispense food, alcoholic and soft drinks during the event to save you money. Every day, our hospitality suite will be available with a happy hour and snacks.

A **free** walking tour on the evening of the 29th will take you to the <u>San Fernando Ca-</u> <u>thedral</u> to see the laser light show. For those who elected the river taxi, your registration packet will contain a pass for a narrated <u>River Tour</u> and a one-day bus pass. A three-

day bus pass is the other option instead of the river taxi/one-day bus pass. Other tours are available to get you to the San Antonio World Heritage Site Missions which is one of only three Urban World Heritage Sites in the US. The other two sites are the Statue of Liberty and Independence Hall. Sign up and pay here for the <u>San Antonio Missions</u> tour. You can book directly with the tour company.





If you haven't registered for the convention yet, it is time to do so. The entire 275 rooms in the hotel are reserved for us. But the hotel is

> starting to fill up. To get the type of room you want may be impossible if you wait too long to register for the convention. We periodically review convention registrations against reserved rooms to make sure rooms are reserved by convention registrants. It is important to provide the hotel with all names of people in your room so they will all receive the daily provided breakfast.

> The final reminder in the Worldwide Newsletter will be in October when the price will have gone up. To take advantage of the current \$200 registration cost and to be able to reserve the room you want, click HERE for a registration form and the ability to pay with a credit card for a \$6 credit card fee. You can also mail the form with a check to save the \$6. Make checks payable to SAPT and mail to P.O. Box 6421 in San Antonio, TX at zip code 78209. The credit

card fee went up to \$6 when the price increased on 1 June. Lock in on our current lowest registration rate now.

He can answer questions by email <u>here</u>. The election will be held on Thursday, October 31st at 9:00 am at the convention.

Have you made plans to attend the Worldwide Convention? Did you register and make your reservation or was it like the stew that could be dealt with tomorrow? While you may have missed some bargain basement early registration fees, the current \$200 registration is still a real bargain for all the fun and benefits you will receive at this convention. Can you imagine several days of completely free hospitality suite drinks and snacks or food? What would that cost? It's included in your registration fee. The Request for Nominations message has been sent to the Prime Timers Chapter contacts. This provides information on the submission of nominations

to serve on the PTWW Board of Directors.

Prime Timers who are interested in serving on the PTWW Board should contact their chapter Board for the details that are in the Request for Nominations message and were previewed in the June "Prime Times" Newsletter.

There will be openings on the Board for this election. Some current Board members are term limited in their current position and others have indicated that they will not seek reelection. Chapter members should consider the volunteer positions on the PTWW Board that will be elected at the San Antonio Convention beginning October 29, 2019.

The PTWW Bylaws describe the positions on the Board and their responsibilities. Anyone interested in being considered for nomination should contact their chapter Board. The Bylaws require that members of the Board be from different chapters, so a chapter may only support one candidate. The prospective nominee must seek support of his chapter and the chapter must submit a letter of support to the Nominating Committee. The nominee must submit a letter to the Nominating Committee indicating his interest, qualifications and position that he seeks. Nominations are due to the Nominating Committee no later than August 13, 2019.

Prime Timers should consider this opportunity to serve on the PTWW Board of Directors as it is sure to be an interesting and rewarding experience.

Included in our regular calendar of club activities were several specific to celebrating Pride Month. Members attended a Pride concert by Windy City Gay Chorus. The concert commemorated Stonewall. A Board member led a walking tour of Halsted St. in Boystown. The guided tour started with a tour of Chicago's gay center, the Center on Halsted, with later stops at the Town Hall Apartments, a gay housing development, the monument to gay veterans, the history plaques of the Legacy Walk, bronze plagues mounted on Rainbow light poles which tell the story of famous LGBTQ's, and ended at a gay bar, Sidetracks. There Tree Sequoia, bartender at Stonewall Inn the night of the raid, was interviewed. A group attended a play, Ms Blakk for President, a true story about a Chicago drag queen who ran for president. One member joined a Pride Month panel discussion at the suburban North Shore Senior Center following a screening of the documentary, Stonewall Uprising. The panel, which paired LGBTQ seniors and youth, discussed Stonewall's effect on our struggle today to defend spaces for us to be our true selves. Many CPT's joined the crowd of one million which viewed the Pride Parade which featured Chicago mayor and out lesbian Lori Lightfoot, then attended a post-parade party hosted by a Board member. CPT celebrates Pride all year.

NEW YORK CITY: World Pride And The 50th Anniversary Of The Stonewall Riots

A small but hardy contingent of Prime Timers of Central Florida (PTCF) members ventured to New York City on the last weekend of June to attend World Pride and the events marking the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Riots.

They found the city awash with thousands of LGBTQ people from around the world in town for the occasion. Some estimates had a million or more people In New York specifically to participate in World Pride and the Stonewall anniversary events.

People came not just for the parties and entertainment connected with World Pride but also to re-commit themselves to fighting for the basic rights that everyone should have: the rights to live their lives openly without fear of losing their jobs or homes or being killed and to love the person(s) they wish.

The Prime Timers joined the queue of LGBTQ people at the entrance to the Stonewall Inn at least once during the weekend to have a drink in the legendary bar in which LGBTQ people stood up to police on June 28, 1969 and said "We're not taking your crap anymore". Fifty years later on the evening of June 28, thousands gathered for a rally which included speeches by such people as New York Mayor Bill de Blasio and Barbara Poma, founder of One Pulse Orlando and owner of Pulse nightclub where 49 LGBT people and allies were killed on June 12, 2016 in Orlando. The evening also included entertainment.

Over the course of the weekend, LGBTQ people flocked to the New York Public Library to see the Walt Whitman: America's Poet and Stonewall 50: Love & Resistance exhibits. the Guggenheim to see Implicit Tensions: Mapplethorpe Now exhibit of Robert Mapplethorpe photographs, the Leslie-Lohman Museum to see Art After Stonewall 1969-1989, and the New York Historical Society to see its Stonewall 50 exhibits. Several other New York cultural institutions also had exhibits and events connected to the 50th anniversary of Stonewall.

Sunday, June 30, was the big day for the Pride March and Pridefest. The march `stepped off at 12 noon from 26th Street and 5th Avenue, went past the Stonewall Inn and Stonewall National Monument and did not wrap up until after midnight at 23rd Street and 7th Avenue. 150,000 An estimated people marched and a million people viewed the march.

Once people had their fill of watching the march, they could take in the booths and entertainment at Pridefest which was held on 4th Avenue between 14th and 9th Streets.

All in all, we PTCF members had a great time enjoying the festivities of both World Pride and New York City's Pride. It was a once-in-alifetime twofer event that we will definitely cherish for the rest of our lives.

The Wichita Chapter of Prime Timers are celebrating 20 years of serving bi and gay men in the surrounding Wichita area. In fact we reach out quite a ways off. We have members in Nebraska, western Kansas and southeast Kansas.

When the Chapter started. there were just eight men who agreed that Prime Timers would be a good fit for Wichita. Dale Sneeringer and Jim Funk became aware of the Worldwide organization in 1998. In April of 1998, there was an organizational meeting held with Dale being elected the first president of the local organization. Others included Gary Hime as Vice-President, Bob Eberly as Chapter Treasurer and Gary Jones as Secretary. It was noted that four others were involved in the startup but their names are not listed.

After a while, a need for a Board of Directors became evident. Bylaws were created based on the Oklahoma City Chapter's and the Chapter was off and running. The Chapter held meetings in members homes at first but as it grew that became a thing of the past, meeting at local restaurants instead.

Our group has a number of couples and one of the first couples was Clyde Mason and Greg Fitsgerald. Clyde was the first chapter publicist creating the first bulletin. After Clyde's death in 2002, a humanitarian award was created in his honor and it still is presented today; the Clyde Mason Award. Greg, who changed his name to Mason, is still a member of the chapter as we continue to honor Clyde for his efforts.

It has not always been easy for the Chapter. A few times some internal strife almost caused the Chapter to go under but some of the guys saw the value of such an

CHANGES TO THE BRAIN CAN MAKE SENIORS MORE VULNERABLE TO FINANCIAL SCAMS

The other day, a coworker told me a story about her father-in-law. He had received a call from the IRS about an overdue tax bill, and needed to pay to get the IRS off his back. He drove to Target, where he purchased \$5,000 worth of gift cards to settle his debt.

Many of us find that sad story hard to believe. We wonder how anyone could be that gullible. The truth, however, is that as we get older, each of us becomes more vulnerable to financial fraud, particularly these gift card scams, a favorite among those who prey upon senior citizens.

Scientists are conducting brain research that looks into why some older people, who when tested show absolutely no cognitive impairment, are at special risk for financial fraud. They are lucid and alert, but it's as though their defenses against scams have quit working altogether.

Mark Lachs, M.D. is a professor of medicine and a geriatrics physician at Weill-Cornell Medicine in New York City, where he focuses on the disenfranchised elderly. Lachs' research has shown that changes in the brain as it ages can make older adults almost defenseless against financial hoaxes—and those are in instances where Alzheimer's or other degeneration of the brain is not present. Lachs calls this "age-associated financial vulnerability".

Nathan Spreng, a neuroscientist at McGill University, put together two study groups of older persons: one group consisted of scam victims, and the other group comprised persons who had averted a scam. Studying the structural integrity of these groups' brains, Spreng found a region that was remarkably smaller in the scam victims than in those who had fended off a scam.

In each of the scam victims, Spreng found a discernable thinning in a part of the brain known as the "insula". The insula is thought to be involved in decision making, and quite possibly may influence our perception of what is and what is not a chancy financial situation.

While the research is promising, it is still in its infancy. Meanwhile, the population is aging. The number of people age 65 and older will nearly double in 30 years, and the fraudsters will grow with us. Only an estimated one in 44 cases is reported. Published studies estimate that older persons lose from \$3 billion to \$36 billion a year to financial exploitation.

If you think it's possible you could be a victim of a financial scam, get a state-specific referral from the <u>National Center on Elder Abuse</u>. If you're concerned that someone close to you could fall victim, have the conversation before a financial or health setback occurs. Look into a limited guardianship, an instrument where a judge grants only certain powers to a trusted person. Also consider a "springing" power of attorney, a document prepared in advance that springs into action when someone's cognitive powers decline past a certain point.

WHAT IS DEPRESSION? By Peter Borgemeister, Rhode Island Prime Timers

"Depression is the smoke from a fire burning somewhere else in your mind"

- Dr. Frank Faltus, psychiatrist with Brown University and Butler Hospital in Providence, RI (and who treated me for a number of years)



Definition: Depression, or persistent feeling 'blue' or 'down', can show up in many ways, and there are a number of checklists (see below) to help you identify it. Common to most of those

lists are hopelessness or guilty thoughts, loss of interest in activities, changes in sleep and/or appetite, loss of energy, and, perhaps most seriously, suicidal thoughts. Kindly note that I'm not

seeking to give medical advice, for which you should have your own team including, if possible, your physician, therapist(s), and perhaps a naturopath or other specialists. There are many good sources of help, including the <u>National</u> <u>Institute of Mental Health</u> and your local chapter of the <u>National Alliance on Mental Illness</u>.

Causes: There can be many causes which can include:

- Genetic; depression can run in families;

- Childhood trauma or abuse;

- Major life changes (e.g., divorce, loss of a partner or job);

- Loneliness;

- Drug and alcohol abuse (often, ironically enough, as an effort to treat depression);

- Other conditions such as, in my case, low thyroid and Vitamin D levels caused, in part, by lead poisoning that likely occurred from stripping paint in old houses.

Treatment: Many treatments have been developed. These include

- 'Talk' therapy;
- CBT (Cognitive Behavioral Therapy);
- Exercise programs;
- Prescription medications (e.g., Prozac & Paxil);

- Naturopathic products such as SAMe, (S-Adenosyl Methionine) and St. John's Wort;

- TMS (Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation).

Treating 'depression' itself can be like ventilating a building to remove the smoke rather than finding the fire and putting it out, to follow through with Dr. Faltus' analogy. This may be one of the reasons that the successful treatment rate hovers at around 50-60%. Different people respond to different things and you may need to keep trying until you find the thing, or combination of things, that brings relief.

Because there may be several causes for your depression, you may need to do several things at once. In my case, to move my treatment-resistant case, I've had to assemble and manage a team that includes people from both the mental-health and medical realms. A breakthrough came last summer when my physician recommended a new test that revealed toxic lead levels, after assuring me several years before based on previous testing, that the levels were OK. Few therapists, being so focused on the mind, would think of testing for the effects of heavy metals on the brain!

My first memory of depression dates from age three which neatly coincided with the age at which I was sexually abused by my father. My mother nicely complimented his efforts, on the physical and emotional fronts. Unsurprisingly, I was an isolated, unhappy kid with the added burden of being gay during the 1950s and '60s, when being gay was still very shameful. As an aside, I didn't begin the process of accepting I was gay until I was 47 and it took another ten years before fully acknowledging it.

By high school I was thinking about suicide constantly and at age 16, had to get the school doctor to write my parents a letter advising professional help. That summer, with great reluctance, my mother took me to see my very first psychiatrist; beginning a series that would stretch, on and off, over 51 years.

What had been deep unhappiness turned into depression after my freshman year at college, in the summer of 1970. It was so bad that I had to withdraw from college. Not knowing what I had and hoping that travel might provide a cure, I took a solo extended trip to Mexico.

Returning to Rhode Island, via Los Angeles and San Francisco, I tried college again with the same results. This was followed by about ten years as a self-employed carpenter, struggling with depression all the while. In 1983, I decided I was finally ready to complete college and graduated with a Bachelor of Architecture from Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) in 1986 - 17 years after matriculating there in 1969! Fortunately, RISD is unusually patient.

This was followed by an internship in various architects' office, a process that was almost painfully difficult, followed by a licensing examination, and a 25-year career as an architect which I'm starting to wind down, with some reluctance given how hard it was to get there, in favor of spending more time writing and doing sculpture, which have been lifelong dreams.

During that period I've learned a lot about depression: what seems to work for me and what doesn't. In the next newsletter, I will share some of this.



ANNIVERSARIES FOR AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER



75 YEARS AGO: Capture of Anne Frank

Born in Frankfurt, Germany, Anne Frank lived most of her life in or

near Amsterdam, Netherlands, having moved there with her family at the age of four and a half when the Nazis gained control over Germany. As persecutions of the Jewish population increased in July 1942, the Franks went into hiding in some concealed rooms behind a bookcase in the building where Anne's father worked. Following their arrest by the Gestapo, the Franks were transported to concentration camps. In October or November 1944, Anne and her sister, Margot, were transferred from Auschwitz to Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, where they died a few months later.



50 YEARS AGO: Woodstock

The Woodstock Music Festival began on August 15, 1969, as half a million people waited on a dairy

farm in Bethel, New York, for the three-day music festival to start. Billed as "An Aquarian Experience: 3 Days of Peace and Music," the epic event would later be known simply as Woodstock and become synonymous with the counterculture movement of the 1960s. Woodstock was a success, but the massive concert didn't come off without a hitch: Last-minute venue changes, bad weather and the hordes of attendees caused major headaches. Still, despite, or because of, a lot of sex, drugs, rock 'n' roll and rain, Woodstock was a peaceful celebration and earned its hallowed place in pop culture history.



60 YEARS AGO: First US State visit by a Soviet leader

Nikita Khrushchev becomes the first Soviet head of state to visit the United States. During the next

two weeks, Khrushchev's visit dominated the news and provided more of a goodwill visit than an opportunity for significant negotiations.

Khrushchev's first day in America was mostly taken up with formal receptions and a motorcade from the airport to downtown Washington. At the airport, Khrushchev announced that he had arrived in America "with open heart and good intentions. The Soviet people want to live in friendship with the American people." During the next few days, Khrushchev took the opportunity to tour the United States before his summit meeting with President Eisenhower.

SEPTEMBER 22

150 YEARS AGO: Opera Das Rheingold first performed

Das Rheingold is the first of the four music dramas that constitute

Richard Wagner's Der Ring des Nibelungen, (English: The Ring of the Nibelung). It was first performed, as a single opera, at the National Theatre Munich.

Wagner wrote the Ring librettos in reverse order, so that Das Rheingold was the last of the texts to be written; it was, however, the first to be set to music. The score was completed in 1854, but Wagner was unwilling to sanction its performance until the whole cycle was complete; he worked intermittently on this music until 1874. The 1869 Munich premiere of Das Rheingold was staged, much against Wagner's wishes, on the orders of his patron, King Ludwig II of Bavaria.
